Water authority regulations

A letter is going out from RYA HQ to all Club secretaries warning them of an ongoing action by Portsmouth water authority, which is exercising its powers to force Clubs to control the use of hoses or other equipment attached to water mains to prevent the possible contamination of the main supply. Solutions include the fitting of holding tanks between the main supply and the hose to prevent any reverse flow – but this can be impractical and expensive. Whilst this is only being pursued by Portsmouth at the moment there is the possibility that other water authorities may follow.

Medway Outdoor Centre

The centre is under threat of budget reductions from Medway Council. RYA CEO Rod Carr has writ-

ten a letter in support and Paul Mara is involved, having had close associations with the centre some years ago. RYA-SE are awaiting a date to visit and discuss the problem.

Maidstone Sailing Club

Maidstone SC is in a difficult situation in that its Club House has been sold for development (they are occupying it on a month by month basis pending the developer deciding to start work!) and whilst Maidstone Council has allocated nearby land in Mote Park



for a new Clubhouse, the
Club has to fund the development. RYA-SE has met the action
committee of
Maidstone to offer advice and guidance

Pagham Harbour

RYA will be submitting formal objections to the draft bylaws sent by West Sussex CC to the Secretary of State for ratification. RYA had not been consulted formally, and has unearthed a number of problems.

Hoo Freezer Lives up to its name

This is traditionally the premier frostbite dinghy race in Page 4 - 6 the South East. The 37th **Pages 7-10** Hoo Freezer was held over the weekend 8th & 9th March, sponsored by Hoo Marina, hosted by Hoo Ness YC and organized with assistance from Wilsonian SC. Other Medway clubs, the Scouts, St. John's Ambulance and the Coast Guard provided safety and medical cover. There was an excellent entry of 72 boats, with



competitors coming from as far away as Southport. The usual schedule was followed, with a practice race on the Saturday, the Hoo Freezer on Sunday, lapping courses with results based on average lap times.

A blustery southwesterly gusting over 30 knots kept many competitors ashore for the practice race, just 30 boats venturing out in the challenging conditions that gave the rescue boats plenty of activity. Only 17 boats survived to record a finish!

The B14's of Chris Bines/David Gibbons and Mark Barnes/Peter Nicolson mastered the conditions well at the front of the fleet over the four laps. Bines/Gibbons held the lead to the line for victory but unfortunately Barnes/Nicolson were disqualified for passing between a freighter and the guard boat. Andrew Peake kept his Musto Skiff powered up to claim second while Chris Matthews/ Ed Gibbons (29er) were third.

On Sunday, in stark contrast, the southwesterly had eased to a light to moderate breeze. This favoured the medium handicap fleet. Simon Cory/Sarah Styles (Buzz) overhauled the leaders, Tony Hunt/Suzanne Hall (V3000), on the second lap to take line honours and lift the Hoo Freezer Cup with Hunt/Hall relegated to third on handicap. Chris Dutton/Claire Hansell (Buzz) also eased ahead of the early leaders and settled for the fourth spot. Meanwhile Steve Hall/Simon Haighton kept well ahead of the other Larks to claim second prize.

The wind had a sting in its tail and a foretaste of the storm to come 12 hours later. As the last boats were finishing and others returning to shore, a squall passed through with winds in excess of 30 knots,





Four clubs contested three races in the West Kent & Sussex Sailing Association's event on 29 March, in a cold and blustery Force 4 at Hedgecourt Lake. Strong gusts were a feature throughout, and very few boats made it to the end of the day without at least one capsize! In the senior event, Jo Wellerd in a Laser Radial took the first race for Crawley Mariners by a narrow margin from Chipstead's Ian Mairs/Tally Watson in their RS200 and Mike Warwicker/Kate Fitzsimmons in their Bough Beech Pacer. Additional Sport England Club & Coach funding for Clubs in England

The aims of this programme were as follows:

- Increase the number and effectiveness of Volvo RYA Champion Clubs.
- Re-energise dormant Volvo RYA Champion Clubs.
- Increase the effectiveness of the OnBoard programme by additionally ensuring an OnBoard club gains Volvo RYA Champion Club status.

In practice this is intended to underpin and augment existing programmes (Volvo RYA Champion Clubs, T15 windsurfing, OnBoard) with the provision of volunteer grants for clubs (£50K per annum – i.e. approx £700 per club) and additional coaching days to develop and support volunteers by the delivery of best practice. Nationwide, this equates to approximately 850 additional coaching days in year 1, rising to approximately 1500 in year 3.

Where are we now?

RYA has satisfied all the award conditions and has been signed off in all 9 English regions. The project start date is 1st of April

2008, with the aim of immediately beginning distribution of volunteer grants (against requests), and arranging coaches on the ground shortly thereafter.

RYA will shortly explain the new funding, and the process by which to apply. Meanwhile, it is currently advertising or Regional Club Coaches to undertake the roles, further details available on: www.rya.org.uk/AboutRYA/iobvacancies

The RYA has produced a Rules Disputes Best Practice (www.rya.org.uk/general/rulesdisputes) to help clubs, race officials and sailors ensure that racing is carried out in an enjoyable way within the Racing Rules of Sailing.

The background to this is that:

- Rules observance is key to good racing however,
- Rules observance is becoming neglected, because
- Rules observance is not backed up by rules enforcement, because
- Too few protests are lodged, because
- Protest hearings are too slow, too late and too adversarial

The RYA has addressed this with new Rules Disputes procedures, of which the main elements are as follows:

- A new 20% place penalty the Exoneration Penalty which can be accepted after coming ashore.
- When no protest is being lodged, a competitor can ask for an **Advisory Hearing** with a Rules Adviser that formalises the type of discussion that often occurs anyway after racing, arising from which a boat might agree to take an Exoneration Penalty.
- When a protest is lodged for an uncomplicated incident, it can be decided promptly by RYA Arbitration run by a single Rules Adviser, whose power to penalize is limited to offering an Exoneration Penalty. If this is


accepted, it resolves the matter; if not, it goes to a full protest hearing with

the normal possibility of disqualification.

The **RYA protest form** on the RYA Website has been modified to deal with Arbitration.







To help this process, the RYA offers a day's training at local venues for potential **Rules Advisers**. This is not a formal qualification, and the decision as to who shall be a Club's Rules Adviser(s) is purely for the Club. The course is aimed at (a) the process of running an advisory hearing or an arbitration hearing, and (b) the techhiques of 'finding facts' – establishing what happened. This course cannot hope to teach all the rules themselves, although there is plenty of practical work to get experience of applying the rules to the facts.

The ideal arrangement is a course at one club attended by members of local clubs – between 12 and 16 people is a good figure. The expenses of the presenter are met by the RYA. A screen and Powerpoint projector are needed.

Portsmouth Yardstick goes electronic

30 clubs around the country, racing cruisers and dinghies and across different types of inland and coastal racing, are helping the RYA improve the data collection of results within the RYA's Portsmouth Yardstick Scheme by using an on-line system.

Since its introduction in 1952, the Portsmouth Yardstick Scheme has relied upon clubs' annual Returns of race results for combination class fleets, both cruisers and dinghies. In recent years these have proven to be too few in number and often of reduced quality. There have also been inaccuracies in the boat data supplied, meaning some of the Secondary and Primary Yardsticks have created local issues. Some classes have not been allocated a Number, as in some instances there has been no data provided.

This has proven particularly frustrating for new classes, often requiring 2 to 3 years to catch up with enough data for publication. Disappointingly, in 2007, less than one third of affiliated clubs made their annual Returns.

Using existing race calculation programs such as 'Sailwave' or equivalent, the new system will provide an on-line results service, at the same time giving the RYA an accurate analysis of the race data. Each club will be able to access the system on line while inputting actual times for their results calculation. Results can be printed off for the notice board and the program will even provide recommendations for local handicap adjustment based upon the results input and previous data collection on a 'race by race' basis for the club. At the same time, the results - together with a race report and images - can be posted for publication on the RYA and individual club's website. A regular check can be kept on individual club's results throughout the year and if a Number is needed for a new class, this may, in extreme cases, be estimated from sufficient published results. All of this, plus seam free, automated Returns to the RYA. Input is straightforward while the results are being processed, and requires one upload to the RYA website. The data is based on actual times, all data is recorded and the natural increase in statistics will provide a greater degree of accuracy. One major point is that the entire scheme still relies upon the clubs Returning consistency of boat type from the published list.

Annual Returns of results from each club will become an automatic process, although they will still require manual validation from the club's Returning officer to keep within the published guidelines. This system should be fully developed for all clubs by January 2009, allowing for an improved handicapping system from the increased results collection scheme. The latest Portsmouth Numbers for 2008 have just been published and are now available on the RYA website.

Nominate someone <u>you</u> know for an RYA Community Award

The RYA Community Awards, launched in 2002, recognise the exceptional voluntary contribution given by individuals. These awards, seen as the 'MBEs' of our sport, are given to people who make a real impact on our sport at local, grass roots level. In November 2007, fifty-three Awards, including six in the Youth Category were presented by HRH the Princess Royal – several of which were earned in the South East Region. Individ-

uals must be nominated by their club/centre or organisation to receive an Award, in one of three categories. Clubs may only make one nomination in each category.

Award Categories

Lifetime Commitment - someone who has shown exceptional commitment and dedication to their club or organisation for at least 10 years

Outstanding Contribution - someone who has volunteered for less than 10 years but who has made a significant contribution. This could be a single or 'one-off' contribution.

Youth - someone under the age of 25 on the 1st October 2008 who has demonstrated a regular commitment and/or inspirational contribution which is over-and-above their own participation or achievement within the sport.

Event notification to MCA (Coastguard)

The MCA have asked clubs for details of main boating events, so that they can be aware of safety issues. RYA-SE Region is therefore asking Clubs to take direct responsibility for this. RYA-SE Area Reps are now advising their sea/estuary Clubs how best to do this

Rather then submit their complete calendar, it is suggested that Clubs be asked to submit something along these lines (with text of course appropriate to the Event and Club):

Club racing (and cruising) takes place every Saturday pm and bank holidays (and/ or other days/times as appropriate) with normally up to NN boats on the water between point A and point B with 2 safety boats in attendance equipped with VHF.

Individual special events (this year Open Event 1 on June XX and Open Event 2 on August YY) will be covered by individual Risk Assessments which will be copied to the MCA in due course.
